### Our membership recovery story



Girl Guides of Canada is continuing our journey of membership recovery to pre-pandemic levels.

The 2022-2023 Guiding year saw a more than 15% increase in girl membership compared to 2021-2022 which allowed Girl Guides to recover 77.8% of our membership as compared to before the pandemic (2019-2020).



The impact of the pandemic on families and the economy has meant an increased demand for our Membership Fee Subsidy Program. We were able to ensure that funds were available for more than 6,500 girls who registered with a subsidy in 2023.

Over the last several years, Girl Guides has focused on rebuilding our membership base, increasing available space for girls in high-demand areas and making improvements to elevate the best of what we offer girls and women across Canada.

# The first year of Embers

Girl Guides of Canada announced Embers as the new branch name for girls ages 7 and 8 in January 2023. New resources and a new Ember Story were created to support units in celebrating this change.

#### **Embers Story Contest**

More than 4,600 Sparks, Embers and Guides submitted their creative ideas to the Ember Story Contest.

The new Ember story was inspired and co-created by the winner of the contest: Nora, an Ember in Manitoba. Nora worked with Canadian children's author Ashley Spires and the Programs team at Girl Guides to create a story that is truly for girls and by girls.





#### **Celebrating Embers**

Inspired by the new branch name and Ember story, a Becoming Embers Instant Meeting was developed to encourage units to find new ceremonies, songs, enrolment ideas and more to celebrate the new name.







# National Service Project: ReconciliACTIONs

Girl Guides of Canada's 2021-2023 National Service Project: ReconciliACTIONs helped to deliver on our commitments to celebrate Indigenous cultures and expand awareness of the impact and history of residential schools.

This was achieved with the help of our partners at the Gord Downie & Chanie Wenjack Fund who provided toolkits filled with engaging resources and ideas for units to add ACTION to reconciliation.











### 2023 Highlights



#### Spark Year-in-a-Box

The Spark Year-in-a-Box supported Sparks and their Guiders in having a full year of fun! It included twelve meeting plans, a back pocket activity list, theme badge activity ideas and more!

#### **Celebrate Summer activity packs**

These take-home activity packs meant that Sparks, Embers, Guides, Pathfinders and Rangers could have fun outside, celebrate sunshine and stay connected to Guiding all summer long.





#### **Inclusive programming**

Our new Different Together Badge-in-a-Box and Exploring Anti-Racism Instant Meeting, along with updates to Our Identities and Love is Love Instant Meetings, increased access to inclusive programming to create spaces where girls can belong.



#### Learn to Code with Canada Learning Code

For the second year in a row, Girl Guides partnered with Canada Learning Code to provide more than 800 girl members at all branch levels with the opportunity to develop their coding and digital literacy skills as part of a virtual event.



# Change Maker Award

Girl Guides of Canada's Change Maker Award recognizes the courageous and inspiring actions of girls from all branches and celebrates the compassionate young leaders they're becoming.



#### Meet some of our 2023 Change Maker Award recipients



Hannah made welcome cards and raised money to buy school bags, books and paint to help newcomers and refugees in Canada settle into their new home as part of a Warm Welcome initiative.



Iyah made 60 care packages filled with water bottles, snacks and toiletries to donate to a local shelter. Iyah even inspired a group of her friends to join in!



Sofia created a campaign at her school to challenge kids to think about how they treat others. She made posters with information on neurodiversity and ways to make others feel included and accepted.



Taylor used their leadership skills to protect the environment, improve the community and support diabetes research. Taylor organized a Walk Run Roll event which helped raise awareness and support research for diabetes.

# 2023 Highlights

Supporting our volunteers means equipping them with the resources they need to lead girls through a variety of fun activities, all year long.



**12,138** Unit Calendars were sent to Guiders across the country. This resource calendar included tips, tricks, reminders and programming suggestions that aligned with the Big Ideas Calendar.

#### **Big Ideas Calendar**

For the third year in a row, the Big Ideas Calendar was the year-at-a-glance resource for Guiders. It had inspiration for district camps, unit bridging ideas, unit activities and more.



#### **Putting safety first**

Keeping members safe has always been a priority for Girl Guides. In 2023, the focus was on providing easy-to-use risk management tools and resources to volunteers such as Pocket Planners for popular activities, expanding the list of A to Z of Activities and creating a Supervisor and First Aid Ratio Calculator.





#### **Unit Experience Compass**

The Unit Experience Compass is an interactive tool to help Guiders create variety in activities as the unit works towards completing badges and achieving goals.

### 2023 Highlights



#### **Campus Connections**

2023 was the first year of Campus Connections, a project to engage post-secondary students in leadership development training, mentorship, volunteering and meaningful experiences to mitigate social isolation on campus.

The pilot started at the University of Guelph and expanded to include Trent University, McMaster University and University of Waterloo in Ontario as well as Dalhousie University and Mount Saint Vincent University in Nova Scotia.

#### **Sisterhood Challenge**

Adult members were encouraged to nurture and strengthen their relationships within the Guiding sisterhood as part of the challenge.





#### **Supporting our Guiders**

Trainers across the country ran 131 virtual training sessions on the National Training Calendar on topics ranging from new Guider supports to outdoor activities.

#### Fall into Guiding Challenge

Adult, bridging and Ranger-aged members were encouraged to be prepared for the new Guiding year by completing trainings as part of this challenge.



#### **Winter WonderLearn Training Convention**

More than 800 members joined this virtual training convention to prepare adult members and Rangers for a strong second half of the Guiding year.





### **National Youth Council**

The National Youth Council provides insights and input to Girl Guides of Canada's Board of Directors and staff on what matters to girls, ensuring that girls' voices and perspectives are front and centre in decisions shaping the future of Guiding. The 2023-2024 National Youth Council is made up of members from British Columbia, Alberta, Ontario, Québec, Nunavut, Nova Scotia and Newfoundland and Labrador.


# National Indigenous Advisory Circle
