

	<p>Alien Invaders</p> <p>Do you want to make a positive impact on your community by providing a safe environment for native plant and animal species? In the Alien Invaders Challenge, you will learn about invasive species in your communities, and promote actions that you can take.</p>
	<p>Arts to Go: Circus</p> <p>Remember that feeling of excitement and wonder as you immerse yourself in a world of imagination, daring and fun! Join the Circus! Take part in the Arts to Go Circus Challenge and experience the world of music, dance, drama and crafts</p>
	<p>Arts to Go: Food</p> <p>In a hurry? Want a taste of the Arts in your Unit meeting? The Arts To Go resources are packed with quick and simple choices to satisfy your appetite for music, dancing, crafts and drama. Think of it as your picnic basket to open and enjoy!</p>
	<p>Arts to Go: Passport to the Arts</p> <p>Get onboard! Take part in the Arts to Go – Passport to the Arts Challenge, and experience the world in dance, music, crafts and drama. Look forward to feeling the excitement and wonder of discovering other countries as you immerse yourself in other cultures.</p>
	<p>Colour Me Healthy</p> <p>This challenge was created to replace the now discontinued Active Living Challenge. It encompasses the same principles: to explore healthy lifestyles through fitness, healthy eating and a positive self-esteem. To encourage completion of this challenge at every level, four separate branch level challenges and crests have been developed.</p>
	<p>CSI</p> <p>The increased popularity in TV show themes has resulted in program challenges and activities that are show theme related. This CSI challenge, through a range of STEM activities, provides an opportunity to discover what it is that forensic investigators actually do.</p>
	<p>Diversity</p> <p>This challenge has been created to encourage girls and Guiders to explore the concepts of diversity and what it means in the community where they live.</p>

BC Program Challenges


	<p>Eco Pak The environment covers a wide range of subjects and concepts including ecology, forestry, sustainability, pollution prevention and conservation. The Eco Pak helps us learn more about our environment and environmental stewardship through a variety of games, activities, experiments and service projects.</p>
	<p>Girls WorldWide This challenge provides an opportunity to learn about the issues and concerns facing women and children throughout the world. It focuses on past millennium development goals: achieve universal primary education, promote gender equality and empower women, reduce child mortality and improve maternal health. If we focus on our world at a personal level, it is easier to begin to make change in the world.</p>
	<p>Ocean Aware The Ocean Aware challenge is designed to increase awareness, understanding and curiosity about the ocean and the seven principles of ocean literacy – regardless of where you live. Everything you find in this challenge will help you explore marine science through hands-on activities, observations and exploration – without boats, life jackets or even having to visit the ocean (though visits are encouraged)!</p>
	<p>Shakeout Challenge This challenge promotes Earthquake preparedness through a Shakeout meeting and Earthquake drill.</p>
	<p>STEM Challenge: Science, Technology, Engineering and Math The objective of the challenge is to engage girls in learning more about biological and chemical reactions and the concepts of physics; improving awareness of computers, electronic devices and communication technologies; to engage girls in different types of engineering including civil, mechanical, electrical and chemical; and to have fun improving awareness of mathematics, logic and problem solving.</p>

	<p>GUEST: Guides Exploring Science and Technology This annual event for Guide patrols rotates through three regions of the province - Vancouver Island, Northern BC and the BC Interior. For the upcoming year, we hope to add a fourth region—the Lower Mainland. The goal of the event is to introduce Guides to the wonderful wide world of science, while experiencing a taste of university life.</p>
	<p>Pathfinder Summit This biennial event for 2nd and 3rd year of Pathfinders who travel to Vancouver as patrols and explore the Pathfinder Program, with a focus on leadership. Participants explore subjects they might not encounter at unit meetings and are encouraged to share their experiences with their units. The event takes place at Guide House in Vancouver and Hi-Vancouver Jericho Beach Hostel.</p>
	<p>Ranger Revolution This biennial event is for girls registered and active in Ranger units as well as for those participating as unit assistants. This event is different from all other Program Committee events, as girls can register either as a patrol or as individuals and is tailored specifically to Ranger-aged girls, with a variety of sessions, including Junior Leader specific topics. The event takes place at Guide House in Vancouver and Hi-Vancouver Jericho Beach Hostel.</p>

Meet Your Area Program Advisers

Lougheed Area: Becca Stephen

Becca has been involved in Guiding since Brownies, first as a girl and currently as a Guider. She has led girls at all levels and is currently working with Rangers in addition to being an Area Program Adviser. Most recently, she was the driving force between Lougheed Area's Zombie Apocalypse event for Pathfinders and Rangers. She created the Lougheed Area Gets Active Challenge to promote Physical Literacy in the area, and is currently working on putting together a Resource Centre for Camp Kanaka.

Becca has her Bachelor of Recreation Management where she completed a research project on how to better engage 18—35 year olds in Girl Guides. She often jokes about the fact that she's a "professional Girl Guide". She has a variety of recreation experience including leading outdoor youth recreation programs, supervising and mentoring teams of volunteers and managing recreation and leadership programs in schools. She is currently working with North Vancouver Recreation and Culture and sits on the board of directors for ProMOTION Plus, an organization that works to empower girls and women in sports and physical activity.

Becca is passionate about helping girls and young women realize their full potential as leaders, encouraging them to increase their knowledge and skills so that they have what they need to make a difference in their community and beyond. She is also a strong advocate for girls who have come up through Guiding and the value they bring to our organization.

Monashee Area: Claire Sokoloski

Claire became a leader when her now 19 year old daughter became a Brownie. Her unit quickly grew to 50 girls (yes, 50!) and her love for planning, organizing and programming began!

In the 13 years that Claire has been a leader, she has been contact Guider for every branch (sometimes 2 branches in the same year); Deputy Commissioner, District Commissioner, Cookie Adviser, District Program Adviser and most recently, Area Program Adviser. She has taken groups of Guides, Pathfinders and Rangers to numerous extended adventures to the US, Mexico and Australia and is hoping to plan a trip to Our Chalet next.

In all these positions, her favourite has always been programming. Her goal is to let Guiders know about challenges and activities that are not only prevalent in the area, but in the province and in the other provinces. Claire is a huge believer in allowing the girls to spread their wings ... and that "even" Sparks can influence what their unit does and can be a big important part of choosing their programming. Her passion is to allow girls to learn new skills in a safe and fun environment and teach girls of all ages to be comfortable in their own skin. She can often be heard saying "If it's not fun it's not Guiding". In her area, coming up in November, there will be a 2 day WOWSA Challenge for Sparks and Brownies.

Lones

What is Lones?

Lones is a distance unit that makes it possible for all girls to have the opportunity despite challenges that they may face in considering a regular local unit. Examples of these challenges may include: distance, health, physical challenge, school workload, lack of time, transportation, or lives outside of Canada temporarily.

Where are BC Lones?

There are currently girls at most levels of Guiding and from all around BC who are registered in Lones.

How does Lones work?

Lones participate in the Guiding program via email, facebook or mail. Each Lone is assigned to a Unit and a Guider. It is her responsibility to correspond as regularly as she can with her Unit Guider.

The Guider works with the Lone to create a program plan that will empower her to complete the challenges and program work that she wishes to complete. The Guider may use a variety of mediums to encourage program completion which may include games, crafts, pictures, songs, setting personal challenges and goals, and taking part in service activities.

The Guider will communicate ideas with the girls and ask the girls to share their ideas and news with other girls and with the Province. This helps to keep the Lones involved and building their new friendships.

How do Lones find out about opportunities?

The Lone is encouraged to connect with a unit within

her area so that she can take advantage of District and Area opportunities as well as participate in cookie sales.

The Guider will keep the Lone aware of upcoming events and special activities. If the Lone is interested in participating, she and her Guider will work together to eliminate any obstacles.

Do Lones have the same privileges as other girls?

Lones have all the privileges that any other girl member of their age has. If the Lone can meet the criteria, she can apply for Provincial, National and International camps and events. She is also able to apply for the Guiding Bursaries and Scholarships when she is of age.

How do girls register in Lones?

All Lones are required to register through Province. You will need to complete and send in the following forms:

April 2017 Ceremonies: There are many types of ceremonies including opening, closing, enrolment, advancement, badges and awards, grace, campfire, Reflections and Colours. Although this issue concentrates on advancement ideas, they can be used for just about any theme ceremony. You are limited only by your imagination

December 2016 Program in the Winter Wonderland: This issue focuses on taking program outdoors in the winter. Even though its getting cold outside, there are lots of things you can do in the cold and in the snow.

September 2016 Program Loves The Outdoors Even though our units meet all year, there is only so much time designated to program during regular meetings. You can incorporate fun and creative program activities into your camps and outdoor events. This issue will give you a variety of ideas to be used in the outdoors.

March 2016 Turning Discussions into Fun Activities While we realize that some of the “discussion” parts of the program are difficult to do, they are necessary to complete program. This issue addresses these “discussion” requirements in fun ways that often lead to animated discussion and always cover program.

October 2015 Words in Action This issue was developed to be used as a supplemental resource when doing the past National Service Project “Words in Action”. Understanding the importance of literacy in Canada and ways to promote it will never lose relevance, therefore although the challenge no longer exists, the resource still adds value to program work.

USING THEMES FOR PROGRAMMING is a three part issue with ideas using a variety of themes to carry out program. One idea in each edition is for younger girls and one is for older girls, but in all cases, program can be adapted so the theme suits a wide variety of ages.

May 2015 Part 3 This issue includes “The Princess in Me and “Superhero Boot Camp”. Both of these themes are built around self-esteem and personal development.

March 2015 Part 2 This issue includes “Owls” and “Harry Potter”

December 2014 Part 1 This issue includes “Guides in Wonderland” and “Myth Quest”

October 2014 Colour Me Healthy is all about healthy living. It concentrates on activities that teach about getting active, eating healthy and promoting self esteem. This issue is meant to give additional ideas that work with the Colour Me Healthy Challenge.

May 2014 Nature Nut A substantial part of the Guiding year should be spent outside, becoming familiar with the environment and learning about nature. This issue gives some ideas for how to do that.

January 2014 Operation Earth Action Issue. This issue has a variety of additional ways that girls can learn to take care of the world around them. Although this was originally based on the National Service Project “Operation Earth Action”, it is still very relevant.

October 2013 Enrolment Ideas Issue. Get all your enrolment questions answered in this issue of FunFinder. How do you plan an enrolment? What are some enrolment ideas for different levels? Are there any traditions? And so much more!

CHALLENGE INSTANT MEETINGS is a two part issue addressed ideas for many of the challenges that are / were available, both Nationally and Provincially

June 2013 Part 2 - Challenges included are: CSI Challenge, Nova Scotia SPCA Challenge; Diversity Challenge; STEM Engineering Challenge

April 2013 Part 1- Challenges included are: Active Living Challenge; Nedic: Love Yourself Challenge; Arts to Go Food Challenge and STEM Technology Challenge

December 2012 Hat Craft/Traders/SWAPS: What is a SWAP? A Swap is a “Special Watchamacalit Affectionately Pinned Somewhere” or “Something with a Pin”. This issue includes a variety of examples shared by Program Advisers around BC.

CELEBRATIONS: For a year, the FunFinder focused on traditional as well as obscure, fun and crazy celebrations.
